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## Information about using Norethisterone to delay a period

Norethisterone can be used to delay a period, for example before a holiday. Recent studies suggest that the strength of the hormone 'progesterone' in this prescription is equivalent to that in the combined contraception pill. Progesterone can increase the risk of developing blood clots (known as deep vein thrombosis/DVT and pulmonary embolism/PE) in women with certain risk factors. These risk factors include:

- Obesity (BMI more than 30)
- Smoking
- Previous history of blood clots in yourself or close family members
- Blood clotting disorders e.g. thrombophilia
- Immobility e.g. wheelchair-bound or going on long journeys

## How to take norethisterone

You'll usually be prescribed 3 norethisterone tablets a day, starting 3 to 4 days before you expect your period to begin.

Your period should arrive 2 to 3 days after you stop taking the medication.

But norethisterone does not act as a contraceptive when used in this way, so you could still get pregnant.

You'll need to use another type of contraceptive, such as a condom.

How well it works in delaying periods also varies between women.

Some women taking norethisterone have reported side effects, such as:

- breast tenderness
- nausea
- headache
- disturbances in mood and sex drive
